## **THE PASTOR'S PEN**

It really is only a game. Sometimes we take sports too seriously, and in unhealthy and unspiritual ways. We need to remember which things that are substantively a part of life and which things which are just a game. We need to work hard on keeping that from getting twisted. I mention this because of a couple a situations surrounding the National Football League. There is no spectator sport that I like to watch more than the NFL. I have gone to a few games, mostly to see the Titans, but enjoy it almost as much in front of my television. But I work to keep it in perspective.

I mention this because of some situations regarding NFL games that are unsettling. One is the account of a man in Georgia who was a New Orleans Saints fan who shot two San Francisco 49ers fans because they were cheering for their team in an Applebee's Restaurant. One is in serious condition. It boggles my mind that one would compromise another human's life. It takes it to another low when it is over something as meaningless as a sports event.

On another note, now that the Denver Broncos football time has lost and are out of the playoffs I want to confess that I have mixed feelings about their quarterback Tim Tebow. Tim Tebow is the quarterback for the Denver Broncos. Though many professional analysts clearly state that he does not have the skills one would normally expect out of a quarterback at the professional level he was able to do something that was beyond the expectation of him. The Broncos had lost four of their first five games of the season and decided to insert Tim Tebow as the starting quarterback. Tebow was able to lead the Broncos to victory and eventually a string of victories were to follow, with many of those victories coming in dramatic fashion. They won enough games to make it to the playoffs and then beat a favored Pittsburgh Steelers team.

However, the following week the Broncos lost badly to the New England Patriots.

Even though many NFL teams have had miraculous finishes to their season and have gone on and won playoff games there are one characteristic about Tim Tebow that I feel warrants my taking the time to write about it. Tebow is very strong in his Christian faith. I believe that his faith is clear and sincere. Tebow could be seen praying during the game at various points and even after the game, regardless of the outcome. Praying is what is expected of Christians (James 5:16). And even in these situations prayer is more than appropriate. That is not where my mixed feelings come in.

I have mixed feelings because there will be those who have misinterpretations when they see him praying. Because he has had success on the field this year some have come to believe that his success is divine intervention because of his faith. God does intervene in our lives. Whether it is Moses and the people of Israel crossing the Red Sea (Exodus 14) or Martin Luther King Jr. and many others seeking to cross the Edmund Pettis Bridge in Alabama God is working on behalf of them. But I get concerned that there are those who feel God cares about who wins a football game. God does not roll like that. God is concerned about things that add to the quality and character of life (John 10:10). God is concerned about our understanding that we need to give him Glory for the things he does do for us, whether they are ordinary or extraordinary (Revelation 19:7).

Enjoy games, and other recreational activities. But don't let them consume you to the degree that you lose perspective on things which really matter.

**DIGEST OF SERMON****“GUILT BY ASSOCIATION”****Pastor Kelly M. Smith Jr.****10:00 a. m., January 15, 2012****Scriptural Text: Mark 13:9-13****Focus Verse: Mark 13:9**

The book of Mark is the shortest of the four gospels in the Bible. There are only 16 chapters in this entire book.

**Question to ponder:** “If you were accused of being a Christian, would there be enough evidence to prove it?” We are accused of our association with many things in life; sometimes those associations are contrary to our best interests. However, we should never be ashamed or apologetic about being identified with Jesus Christ. There is more to this than just claiming to be a Christian. Too often the label is loosely used. It is about an intentional willingness to be identified with Jesus.

All through His life, Jesus had to deal with many different kinds of associations. How do you handle being found guilty because of your associations? How do you handle being found guilty of your association with Jesus Christ? Be identified, but do not be ashamed! Stand by the power of the Holy Spirit and do not be afraid.

Jesus warned His disciples to be on guard because of their association with Him. How do we prepare for our association with Jesus?

**Point 1 – We Must Be Willing To Be On Guard.**

Jesus tells us that because of our association with Him, people will come after us and try to do various things to us. We are not to be surprised by this and we must be on guard, so that our responses are appropriate with the characteristics of a Christian.

**Point 2 – We Must Trust the Power of the Spirit.**

Jesus tells His disciples to stand guard, trouble may be lurking. But He doesn't tell them to run for cover. Instead, He tells them to preach the gospel. When persons attack us because of our association with Jesus Christ, we must take these opportunities to speak the Words of Jesus Christ. We must trust that, during these times, the Holy Spirit will give us what it is that we must say. In the midst of these times, there is a presence that can come over us to let us know that things will be all right. Jesus wants us to know that that presence is the Holy Spirit, when we speak on behalf of the Gospel.

**Point 3 – We Must Stand Firm for the Right Thing.**

In the framework of the Christian faith, there will be conflicts in the family. Jesus makes some unsettling claims: brothers betraying brothers, father against child, and children rebelling against parents. Yet we still must know what's worth standing for. Those of us who are people of faith must make some determinations on how we will stand. We can stand firm knowing that God is always there. Be not afraid to be called guilty by association, when that association is with Jesus Christ!
